# PATRIOTIC SPEECH CONTEST | 2023-24

Patriotism can be manifested (displayed) in many different forms: devotion to the welfare of one's fellow citizens, the virtues and actions of a patriot, and the passion which inspires one to serve one's country.

Each year the Peoria Unified School District sponsors a speech contest to help students deepen their public speaking skills and express their patriotism; all fifth through eighth grade students are highly encouraged to participate in their school contests.

The Patriotic Speech Contest aligns with Peoria Unified's Exit Outcomes, as well as Arizona's English Language Arts Standards and History and Social Science Standards. This event is a point of pride here in Peoria Unified and you are invited to write and deliver a patriotic speech.

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#### **GENERAL INFORMATION**

To participate in the speech contest, you will first deliver your speech in your classroom based on the criteria below. Your teacher will then choose students to represent your class at the school speech contest which will be held **on Friday, February 9, 2024**, at 9 am in the Sunset Heights Library.

This year, the Peoria Unified district-wide speech contest will be held at the District Administration Center on March 7, 2024. Similar to years past, the contest will be split into four competitions with two separate meeting times.

Each school will send two students: one school representative from fifth or sixth grade and one school representative from seventh or eighth grade.

# STUDENT GUIDELINES

#### **RULES**

- Student speeches must be within the required time limit or points will be deducted. If you are in fifth or sixth
  grade, your speech should be 2-3 minutes. However, seventh and eighth grade student speeches should be 3-5
  minutes.
- Only contestants, parents/guardians, teachers, administrators, and judges of the speech contest will attend the school contest.
- Parents or Guardians may help in the editing, revising, and delivery process, but the speech must be the student's own, original work.
- Audio-visual equipment, singing, props, or costumes may not be used.
- If content of any speech strays from the topics provided, it may lead to the disqualification of the student and speech from the speech contest.
- Students may only give a speech that is their own original work from the current school year.
- Judges will select the winners using the following criteria:
  - o Content/Organization | Introduction, Topic support, Conclusion, Purpose, Patriotism
  - Delivery | Voice Intonation, Articulation, Poise, Eye Contact, Body Language, Appearance (clothing appropriate for public speaking)

# GUIDING QUESTIONS IN DEVELOPING YOUR SPEECH

- Does your opinion or claim have substantial evidence to support it?
- How does your opinion or claim relate to patriotism?
- What does your opinion or claim mean for America past, present, or future?
- How does your opinion or claim relate to the world we live in now?
- If choosing the quote prompt, (7<sup>th</sup> or 8<sup>th</sup> grade) look at Roosevelt's quote. What role does/did he play in our country? Why would he have written it? What was going on in the world at the time this quote was written? What does the quote mean for America today?
- How do you connect personally to your opinion or claim?

# HELPFUL HINTS FOR WRITING YOUR SPEECH

# **PREWRITING**

- Read through each topic specific to your grade level. Speech topics focus on patriotism, civic duties, rights, and responsibilities.
- Choose the topic that appeals to you most.
- Research your topic thoroughly using credible sources and in coordination with teacher directions and instruction. Take notes as you research.

# **DRAFTING**

- Present your information in logical order.
- Write an introduction in which you state your <u>opinion</u> and <u>supporting reasons</u>. (Consider adding a formal beginning: Welcome judges, fellow contestants, parents, and guests...)
- Write body paragraphs in which you turn your reasons into topic sentences and support them with <u>evidence</u>, <u>examples</u>, <u>explanations</u>, <u>and elaboration</u>.
- Write a concluding statement or paragraph that restates your <u>opinion</u> and <u>supporting reasons</u> and wraps up your speech. Strive to leave the audience thinking about what you have said. You want to be remembered long after your speech is over.

# **REVISING & PUBLISHING**

- Revise your speech by deleting unnecessary words and phrases, adding details, changing vocabulary words, and rearranging sentences.
- Edit for conventions (capitalization, usage, punctuation, and spelling).
- Write your speech on notecards.

# HELPFUL HINTS FOR PRESENTING YOUR SPEECH

# ONCE YOUR SPEECH IS WRITTEN, THINK ABOUT HOW YOU WILL PRESENT IT

- Maintain eye contact with the people in your audience as you are speaking. Convince them you have something valuable to say.
- Use hand gestures and movement. Emphasize the high points of your speech by pointing and pounding your fist. But be careful not to overuse gestures as they may distract from what your message is.
- Speak clearly. Enunciate and speak so your audience can hear you. Your message is important; you don't
  want them to miss it.

# AFTER CONSIDERING YOUR PRESENTATION TECHNIQUES: PRACTICE, PRACTICE, PRACTICE

- Notecards are allowed, but by practicing and rehearsing your speech, you won't need to read from them. (Do not write your speech out on paper.)
- Practice your speech in front of your family members or close friends. Ask for their feedback.
- Practice your speech in front of a mirror.
- Have a family member record you while you present your speech so that you can watch it to identify strengths
  and opportunities for change.
- Remain within the specified time frame. When practicing, time yourself. This will help you see if you need to slow down, add information, or delete information from your speech.
- Try to memorize your speech. A memorized speech shows commitment to your topic.

# ON THE DAY YOU PRESENT, BE CONFIDENT IN ALL YOU HAVE ACCOMPLISHED

- Appearance is an important ingredient in presenting a successful speech. Ensure your appearance and clothing
  are appropriate for public speaking.
- Relax you will find that you are able to do a much better job if you are able to relax on the day of your speech. Take deep breaths and power pose in preparation for your speech. You will be amazed at the confidence you will gain.
