
How to Present Your Genius Hour Project

On Tuesday May 14, your project will be displayed on a table in the cafeteria. Visitors, including your family, will be viewing your project along with all the other projects on display, so you'll want your display to be interesting and colorful! You have a lot of freedom in how your project is displayed, just consider these guidelines:



- Your genius hour question must be displayed at the top of your presentation board.
- Your presentation must <u>fully answer</u>
 <u>your Genius Hour question</u>. Type or
 write the answer to your question in
 your own words. <u>Copying and pasting</u>
 <u>blocks of text is not acceptable</u>.
 Rewrite all information in your own
 words.
- 3. Use pictures or charts <u>related to your</u> <u>topic</u> to make your display visually interesting.
- 4. Design your display so that it can explain itself. This means that people <u>can look at</u> your display and learn about your project without you being there to explain it.
- 5. Your display must be able to stand by itself on a table top. You will have part of a cafeteria table top to display your project. **Your display must be able to stand up by itself on a table top.** We recommend using a tri-fold display to present your project.
- 6. You can add models in front of the display or add a laptop/tablet with video, sounds, or pictures.

 Models, laptops, or tablets or allowed only to add extra detail to your display. You MUST also have a display board that answers your genius hour question too.
- 7. Display your **full name** (first and last) on the front of your board underneath the genius hour question.

Presentation can be read and understood without the student explaining it. (10 points)	
Presentation includes pictures, graphs, charts, or other elements to make it visually interesting and are related to the topic. (10 points)

DO NOT copy and paste text directly from a website or other source. (40 points)
